## Concerts

Celebrate great music and make a difference in our community



✓ We finished the '21-'22 concert season in May with performances by The Notables from The Haverford School and The B-Flats from The Baldwin School, both high school a cappella groups that performed popular and classical works, in support of the Chester Children's Chorus. In March, we hosted a performance by soprano Kara Goodrich, supporting Project W. Performing classical vocal works and featuring compositions written by women, the concert helped support the work that Project W does to lift up and promote underserved women in Delaware County.





- In October 2022, we brought tenor Bryan Hoyos to perform a program of Hispanic and Latinx works, in support of Asociación Puertorriqueños en Marcha (APM). Singing art song, opera and music theater, Bryan's performance helped support the work APM does to build, sustain and support the Latinx community in Philadelphia.
- To wrap up the 2022 year of concerts, Elisa Muzzillo performed a concert of flute works, featuring compositions by Valerie Coleman, Robert Schumann among others, and some favorite Christmas tunes. The concert benefitted Philabundance to



help fight hunger and scarcity in our communities.



**Children's Music Ministry** 

- Our children continue to have fun and informal music opportunities once a month during "Kids' Cafe", where they can sing and play songs with Miss Lee and Pastor Taylor.
- The children's choir has collaborated with the Chancel choir, playing chimes and percussion instruments, as well as singing.
- Music was a big part Vacation Bible Camp, which included a performance at the end of the week.
- They performed during the Advent Open House and were featured as part of the annual Christmas Pageant, The Way to Bethlehem.









### Adult Music Ministry

Wallingford Winds continued to play for special services at WPC, including Easter, "Music Appreciation Sunday", Christ the



King Sunday, and Christmas Eve.

- Our bell choir and chancel choir performed regularly throughout the year in a variety of styles and genres, often featuring solos by our wonderful staff singers, Kara Goodrich (soprano) and Tyler Gibson (tenor).
- Choir members volunteered to carol at Hedgerow Theater, serenading guests on their way to see A Christmas Carol.

## **Education Council**

Throughout the year, Michelle George and Shirley Rudd developed new ideas and methods to address the needs of children and adults with physical, behavioral, and cognitive issues. We feel it is important to show our worshippers our belief that "all are welcome here." Please see their separate report under the heading *Project Disabilities.* 





In July, Vacation Bible Camp welcomed around 20 children as we returned to a Monday through Friday evening format. On the last night, the children enthusiastically sang the songs they learned to their parents and caregivers in the sanctuary. Older children recreated the story of Joseph the Dreamer (the one with the coat of many colors) as all the children had learned how his faith in God enabled him to save Egypt from famine.

In September, we

were able to resume weekly Faith Formation classes for children concurrent with the worship service. Attendance is markedly improved from last year which both children and teachers enjoy.

In October, we joined the Mission and Service Committee to encourage the donation of new socks to be distributed to local organizations. Together we collected over 450 pairs for adults and children.





In December, the Education Council hosted an Advent Open House where many children, parents, and other guests heard a Christmas story after enjoying craft-making, snacks, and singing, along with a preview of a Christmas pageant song. It was a multigenerational event enabling older and younger members to reunite or meet for the first time.



## **Project Disabilities**

The WPC Education Council has been supporting and sponsoring the efforts of Shirley Rudd and Michelle George during 2022 in researching ways to enhance the worship and community experience at Wallingford Presbyterian Church. What started out as an education tool for our volunteer teachers dealing with various learning disabilities has turned into other ways to enhance the worship and participation experience as well.

This initiative has led to offering fidget toys for folks of all ages (positive comments from parents let us know they are appreciative of having

them available). A visual schedule has been available each week for children to anticipate the order and events of our worship service. Our registration cards have been updated to include a thorough and open-ended survey for parents to share pertinent information for volunteers to better serve their children during WPC events such as Faith Formation and youth group. The font on WPC printed materials has been changed to an ADA compliant font that make reading easier. A Sanctuary

Committee has been established to look into better sound in the sanctuary for people with hearing challenges. The Sanctuary Committee is researching other ways to make seeing and participating in the life at WPC easier for everyone including a "disabilities" library for our congregation to learn about different disabilities and how to help those experiencing them as well as upcoming trainings on specific disabilities that our congregation members are currently experiencing.





One challenge we've experienced is what to

title our efforts/projects. We have been saying Disabilities Project, Disabilities Initiative, or Disabilities Program. We are sensitive to those who would prefer not to be labeled as "disabled" as well as those who prefer that language.

While we are continuing to learn about disabilities, we are certainly not experts and enthusiastically welcome suggestions, help, and ideas. What we do know is that all of us know someone, friend or relative, who has a disability of some sort. We may not know what it is because we can't see it. If we can see it, we know they are not looking for sympathy but for understanding of what is happening to them. The hope of our ministry is to provide empathy and understanding to all with the goal of making it easier for folks to continue participating in the life of WPC. 19

## YOUTH AND YOUNG ADULTS

This past year our youth and young adults have proved to be some of the greatest kids and young adults I have had the pleasure of knowing. They not only love to attend things, but they have hearts for service. I am continually inspired by their kindness, selflessness, and love toward others. We have multiple programs for our

younger members as well as opportunities to serve and participate in the larger life of the church, and this past year, they really stepped up!

Youth Group is a monthly program which focuses on giving the youth opportunities to have fellowship and time for reflection. Each month the youth gather for an outing in the community where they can have fun and fellowship and share a meal together.

Highlights include our Urban Air Field Trip where the kids got to jump



on trampolines and do obstacle courses toaether, Trunk

or Treat day when the youth decorated the youth group trunk so well, and Movie Night at AMC when they got to see Wakanda Forever and get to know some of our young adults!

The Young Adult Group is

comprised of college-aged young adults who meet during their breaks in school. We have all kinds of events which include meals together, outings, and more.

Highlights from this year include our Friendsgiving Dinner where we went out to eat together, seeing the Young Adults lead crafts at Advent Fest, and going Ice Skating at the Ice Works rink!

Youth and Young Adult Service in the church expanded this year as they helped out at many events to benefit those other than themselves. The youth and young adults helped out at:



- Advent Open House as crafters and set-up helpers
- Vacation Bible camp as shepherds and decorators and helpers all week
- The Christmas Pageant where they served as co-directors and shepherds for the little ones to know their cues
- Sunday Morning services where they served as liturgists and ushers and Souperbowl of Caring helpers
- Sprouts where the young adults regularly come as leaders to help the children with their crafts and help with set-up and breakdown (Many thanks specifically to Zoe Andrews and Noel Petherbridge for their commitment to this program!)
- Youth Events where young adults come to help set up and be supervisors and helpers for the youth

Confirmation is a program we run every-other year where we invite all highschoolers (specifically focused on freshmen) to have lessons and dinners throughout the year



to explore their faith in preparation for joining the church. This year we have a fantastic group of young people who have really stepped up and committed to the process. We have six kids which is the largest group I have had since coming to WPC, and all of them are lovely to talk to and get along well. Many thanks to the students, their parents, and our great group of mentors for helping make this year wonderful so far!



Highlights include seeing the confirmands get excited to see one another as they know each other from school, watching the mentors and confirmands really hit it off at their first meeting – so much so that they wanted to keep talking!



## CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Here at Wallingford Presbyterian Church we welcome all children, and strive to offer kids of all ages opportunities to learn and grow in their faith and in fellowship with one another. This year we refreshed our programs to offer new

ways for our kids to become integrated into the life of the overall church family. This past year we were blessed as many of our families came back to church following the pandemic, and we also have had many new families join in the fun! This year we offered many children's activities including:





★ Sprouts Monthly Program (K-5<sup>th</sup>) which is a themed night full of fun and friends where the kids get to eat dinner together, do activities and games, and end with a devotional and prayer. This year we added in more themes and activities for the kids to try something new!

 Highlights included Pumpkin Painting Day (where the kids got to paint their own pumpkins and take them home) and Movie Night (where the kids got to have pizza and popcorn while watching Encanto with new little friends!)



★ Kid's Café: Sing and Play! (All ages) which is a program run concurrent with Coffee Hour when the children get to have their own mini "coffee" hour of sorts with kid-friendly snacks and drinks, a chance to sing with Ms. Lee, and a time to play some games while

their parents enjoy chatting with their church family.

 Highlights included the chance for the kids to play the hand chimes to practice for the Christmas pageant, and when they learned their Anthem to sing for the congregation!





★ Vacation Bible Camp was a huge success this year as we had a great turn -out post-pandemic! We had our first week-long VBC in three years, and the kids had so much fun! Our theme was Monumental: Celebrating God's Greatness!

 Highlights were when the new boys came and told their shepherds it was "the best week of their lives!" and when the children performed all their songs and skits on the last night in front of their parents, all dressed up as characters from the Joseph story!



The Children's Christmas Pageant was loads of fun for the children this year as well! Our theme was On the Road to Bethlehem and we acted out all the different characters, animals, and angels who came from afar to see baby Jesus! We had the largest Christmas pageant in my time there with twenty children!





Highlights include: watching the little ones look so proud when they said their lines, seeing how happy the kids were when they got assigned their parts, and having the parents clap and cheer at the end of the pageant – so beautiful!

Advent Open House was so exciting this year as it was a big turn-around from

the past few years! During lock-down we had a virtual Advent Fest, which was small yet adorable, and following that we had small in-person one, but this past year we FILLED the reception room and Fellowship Hall with over 100 attendees! Many thanks to Shirley Rudd and Gail Weaver for helping make the event an adultfriendly space as well, and many thanks to Lee Hagon-Kerr for a very powerful

hymn-sing as the Fellowship Hall boomed with excited voices!

Highlights include: seeing all the adults mingling and enjoying food and drink together, watching the kids and new families make many crafts, seeing the youth and young adults help the little ones make their ornaments, and watching the toddlers dancing up front during the hymn-sing together!



- Time with Young Disciples is a time when children come forward during the worship service to have a little mini-sermonette just for them. The kids enjoyed little scavenger hunts around the sanctuary, exploring and talking about the teaching windows, and learning through play!
  - Highlights include: hearing their genuine, stark, and adorable answers to the questions, watching them set up the nativity set in chancel, and making their Advent wishes together to be hung in the sanctuary!
- Worship Involvement increased this year, as we had many children take part of our services in different ways. We had children serve as liturgists, hand-bell ringers, choir members, pageant participants, ushers, and Souperbowl of Caring helpers!

★ Highlights were seeing the children sing their anthems and ring their handbells for the



service, seeing the children and youth read all of Jesus' journey during Life of Jesus Sunday, and hearing the children read the Christmas story on Christmas Eve! No better way to hear the story of the birth of Jesus than through the voice of a child, amen?

★ Faith Formation (Sunday School) is a program we offer during our 10am Sunday Services for ages 18 months all the way up to 12 years. We changed it this year to have two rooms available: Young Disciples and Junior Disciples and this format works much better for our teachers.

The program has really flourished this past year because the teachers can rotate better, and also the turnout has been absolutely fantastic now that we have many people coming back to church after the pandemic. Many thanks to our teachers and our Sunday School Superintendent Sally Flemer for all their help making this program so fantastic!

 Highlights include: having many children come each Sunday, seeing the children look proud to show their parents their crafts after church, and watching how they make new friends in their classes and then seeing them interact in coffee hour!

## Wallingford Presbyterian Church Deacons 2022 Annual Report

**Blood Drive**- Deacon Tom Erickson coordinates the Blood Drives at the WPC with the American Red Cross, which are held in the fall and spring of each year. In October 2022, only 55 People showed up for our usual 85 slots. The publicity for the blood drives could be improved by signs advertising the dates.

**Care Networks**-Each deacon is provided with a list of families in our congregation. Quarterly letters are mailed from the church to update the members on current events and to remind them deacons are available to help. Deacons serve as a link to see if there are any services needed that could be provided by the Deacons Helpers such as phone calls, visitation, meals, rides to church or medical appointments, companionship, errands, household tasks, outdoor chores, or pet sitting. Our goal is to foster better communication between the deacons and our congregation.





**Deacon Helpers-**When the church administrator receives a phone call from a member of our church community, she contacts the moderator with the request by e-mail. The requests may include transportation to medical appointments, church services or church events, meals, companionship, visits, phone calls, household tasks, outdoor tasks and pet sitting. An updated list of Deacon Helpers has been provided for each deacon, the ministers and the church administrator.

**General Mission**-The church office may receive a phone call for a request from the WPC congregation or the community. The church administrator contacts the moderator and the general mission committee. These requests may include food baskets, holiday gift cards, financial assistance, help to pay for medication, etc. A record of the calls and the outcome is kept in a binder in the church office. Deacons are encouraged to have the family come to our church to pick up gift cards for their own personal security. A list of county resources may also be given to the family requesting help. **Red Wagon-**The Red Wagon is available for members of the community and WPC to drop of non-perishable items to be disturbed by the deacons to The Foundry Church in Garden City, City Team and the Media Food Bank. During the school year the items are sorted in the reception room by BSA Scouts who meet at our church. A list of items is on the WPC website. A committee of deacons and volunteers delivers the donations to the appropriate places on a monthly schedule. The Foundry Church is delivered noon the 3rd Sunday of the month by a deacon, Media Food Bank is delivered by Todd Darr and City Team is delivered by Harold Floyd.





Giving Tree-The Giving Tree is an activity that Deacons host every Christmas season. An artificial Christmas tree is displayed in the Narthex beginning the Sunday before Thanksgiving and the following two Sundays. Names are obtained from the school nurses at the Elementary schools. Gifts tags are hung from the tree so people can choose any number of tags. Then tags are returned the following Sunday with the gift cards being donated. Gift cards are delivered to City Team, Chester Eastside, NPE, WES, SRS, and families suggested from Care Networks. This year we helped 100 children with gift cards for Christmas.

Holiday Gift Cards-Names of families who need gift cards for Christmas and Easter meals are provided by the school nurse in each elementary school in the Wallingford-Swarthmore School District. The deacons purchase the \$25.00 and \$50.00 gift cards from Walmart and Target. They are given to the school contacts to distribute to each family.

**Angel Tree**-This mission supports local prison inmates who want to give gifts to their children. The gift requests include the age of the child, and suggested gifts. Gifts were provided for 9 children.





Visitation- An email is sent weekly to all the deacons with suggestions for visitation on Sundays. After the worship service, two deacons remove the flowers in the sanctuary and bring them to the kitchen to put in multiple vases. Visitation can occur on another day if the deacon has a schedule conflict. Flowers may be given in honor of a birthday, an anniversary, a birth, an illness, a hospitalization, a death or just to thank someone for their help. Visitation may include a personal visit, leaving flowers at the home of the recipient or giving them to the recipient in church. The donation and purchase of smaller vases allow us to make more deliveries.

**Membership Fellowship**-Deacons continue to organize coffee hour quarterly.

**Mission Requests**-The deacons have requested an increase in their annual budget to support the increased need in our community for meals during the holidays, Christmas gift cards, and community requests.

Stephen Ministry is a complete system of training and organizing lay persons for caring ministry in and around their congregations. WPC has been enrolled as a Stephen Series congregation since 1997. In 2022 the combined Stephen Ministry programs of WPC, Swarthmore Presbyterian Church (SPC) and Trinity Episcopal Church (TEC), continued to provide this care to all in our congregations and who

requested it. With the increasing control of the Covid virus in the year 2022, we were able to resume in-person meetings with care receivers. This was particularly important as the pandemic created isolation was hard on many people.

While the confidential nature of what we do prevents us from sharing the details of any of our relationships and makes providing photos difficult, this ministry is deeply fulfilling to those providing care as well as to the care receivers. Over the 25+ years that WPC has been enrolled in Stephen Ministry, scores of care receivers have been helped and over 35 WPC members have been involved in providing care. The currently serving Stephen Leaders from WPC are Roger Demos, Russ Kinder, and Bob Kenworthy.

The Fellowship of Friends is a group of men who meet on Wednesday mornings to discuss whatever is on their minds-politics, religion, current events, etc. One of the best parts of FoF is the candor of the group. This is one of the few spots where two people with radically different views can express them in a way that promotes understanding and does not engender anger or name calling. Since we have highly diverse views on most things, especially politics, discussion are often lively and informative. Have a point of view but are afraid to share it? Come out to FoF and speak your mind.



## **Adult Bible Study**

The Adult Bible study is a group of people who are interested in learning how the Word of God as expressed in the Bible can be applied to everyday living. We have been discussing the 12 minor prophets of the Old Testament as well as working in some fun: celebrating birthdays and having an Ugly Sweater Christmas luncheon. Now that COVID has lessened, we plan to reinstitute some of our field trips in 2023 (e.g. Sight and Sound). No Bible knowledge needed, just an interest in learning what God has to say.

## **Peacemaking and Social Justice**

## **Stewardship**

As stewards of the church, Stewardship Council oversees its financial resources and the application of church funds toward purposes approved by Session. It has two subcommittees—Annual Giving and Capital Campaign (currently inactive). It coordinates with the Legacy and Financial Oversight committees and works closely with the church treasurer to develop and monitor the annual budget. Stewardship had an active year, managing the church resources as we have come back to full operation after the Covid pandemic.

#### **Annual Budget**

The church ended 2022 with plate and pledge income higher than budgeted by almost \$15,000, a great end of the year boost. Overall, income was slightly below expenses, but considerably better than the original budget forecast. There were two unbudgeted expenses during the year—funds for the maternity leave replacement for the office administrator and a bonus for Pastor Taylor to thank her for her extra work during Pastor Francois' sabbatical. The Stewardship Council meets every couple of months (more toward the end of the year) to monitor income and expenses.

For 2023, Stewardship Council recommended, and Session approved, an optimistic budget that supports our efforts to continue to expand our vibrant, active church as we emerge from the pandemic. It has an increased investment in our staff, who have maintained our church program with minimal salary increases over the last several years. The budget reflects our desire to advance our mission within the church and in the community, and it requires the continuing generosity of the Congregation. Stewardship Council and Session will continue to look for ways to support and expand our growing mission and program.

### **Annual Giving Committee**

The Annual Faith Giving Campaign was successful again this year. Based on the words of Paul in his letter to the Philippians, "let each of you look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others," we asked the congregation to be *Caring Sharing and Daring*. Giving to the church is *caring*. We all need to be nurtured and cared for by one another, and this means the people within and beyond our congregation, as well as our church building and grounds. We have all been blessed in one way or another with abilities that we can offer. This is sharing. As good stewards of the church we each need to reach out and offer to use our talents and resources to guide and support the many activities and programs within our church and in the community beyond our walls. Both caring and *sharing* require funds to keep them active and growing. Our growth depends on adding new members and doing so requires us to offer innovative programs, activities, and opportunities for worship. These changes and additions are *daring*. We need to *dare* to honor God's blessings and continue the work He has chosen for us to do. We are deeply grateful to the 74 families and individuals who responded to the call by pledging a total of \$338,000.

# Girl Scout Troop 518

From January 2022 - March 2022 Troop 518 engaged in the annual fundraising of cookie sales including holding a cookie booth following service. Beyond fundraising for the troop and Girl Scouts as a whole, the function of the cookie sales also includes social skills, mathematics and marketing.

Outside of cookie sales, the troop worked on activities addressing various scientific principles by making their own bubble solution, Diet Coke rockets and rock candy; aerodynamics of flight through paper airplanes and origami. In addition the girls engaged in a community service project and made dog beds and dog toys that were donated to a local shelter. The end of the Girl Scout year (June) was celebrated by joining with other local troops for a weekend of camping including canoeing, swimming, gaga ball, archery as well as singing and s'mores.

Over the summer, based on the needs and desires of the girls within the troop, the difficult decision was made to have the troop be absorbed into a larger troop to allow for all of the girls to have more time with peers their age while also having opportunities for multi-age activities as well as a better focus on skills and interest by age.

This troop has been a part of the Wallingford Presbyterian Church community for at least a decade and we thank you for the support given to the troop as a whole, the scouts and the leaders during out time with you.

#### Income Statement

Wallingford Presbyterian Church continued to recover from the disruptions caused by the pandemic and returned to essentially normal programming and operations throughout 2022 which positively impacted income. Overall income returned to the level that it was at in 2019 (\$526,000 in 2022 vs. \$529,000 in 2019) prior to the onset of the pandemic, albeit unadjusted for the impact of inflation. Total income in 2022 increased by \$48,000, or 10%, from 2021 excluding the benefit from the forgiven Payroll Protection Program (PPP) loan. Likewise, offering and pledge income was also approximately at 2019 levels (\$480,000 in 2022 vs. \$473,000 in 2019) and increased substantially from 2021 by \$52,000, a 12% increase.

Expenses for the year ended essentially flat with budget (\$5,000 under budget). Actual total expenses for 2022 were \$31,000 higher than 2021 (6%). The only significant variance from budget was in staff salaries where there was an overspend of approximately \$5,000 for an unbudgeted substitute for the church administrator during her maternity leave. However, this was largely offset by an underspend in music due to lower spending on guest soloists and musicians.

#### **Balance Sheet**

At year end 2022 total assets were \$972,466, a decrease of \$182,434, 16%, over 2021. Net assets (equity) at the end of the year was \$150,238, a decrease of \$2.647 from 2021. The decline reflects the weakness in returns in the value of investments which was offset by \$57,440 in interest, dividends and capital gains generated throughout 2022. Cash balances held at the end of 2022 were \$94,187.

#### 2023 Budget

With the return to more normal levels of activity and financial support that existed prior to the onset of the pandemic, future planning can

reflect a return to growth and development of programming and mission of the church. To that end, Session has adopted a budget that reflects a 6.5% increase in spending over 2022. Total income is projected to increase to \$543,000 in 2023, or 5.4%. Expenses are budgeted to increase to \$571,000. The majority of the increase in expenses is driven by increases in staff salaries by 7% across the board to reflect an increase in inflation and to adjust salary levels to more competitive levels which in previous years lagged, especially given the increased efforts required over the last several years. Notably, the associate pastor's compensation was increased 15% to reflect a promotion given her time and achievements in the role and to comply more closely to Presbytery guidelines for her experience level. Other expenses remained near or below 2022 levels with the exception of fuel and utilities which are expected to increase in 2023.

Like most previous years there is projected to be a deficit. This year the gap is approximately \$28,000. Session hopes that as in previous years where such deficits are projected, the congregation will generously close the gap and continue the growth in the mission of the church to a higher level in 2023.

As in past years we are grateful for the many members who have provided their time, money and support. We are especially thankful for the help and support of Michelle Hall, Kate Callahan, Stewardship Council and the counters for their assistance throughout the year.

## **Financial Oversight Committee**

The Financial Oversight Committee is charged with ensuring that the church financial assets are prudently invested to support the day to day as well as long term financial needs of our congregation. The committee meets once a year to review the performance of the existing investments as well as the amount allocated to short term spending needs versus long term funding needs. Currently the church's portfolio consists of a checking account, a savings account and several Vanguard mutual funds - Money Market, UltraShort Term Bond and the Star Fund which is a balanced Stock and Bond fund.

In 2022 total assets decreased approximately 16%. The sole cause of this was an 18% drop in the value of the church's Star Fund holding which represents approximately 70% of the total financial assets. The Star Fund is composed of 40% domestic equities, 20% international equities and 40% bonds and cash, all of which (except cash) suffered in the market collapse in 2022 (versus the 10% gain recorded in 2021). The church's balance sheet is still healthy since this fund is used primarily for the MEND, Legacy, Hayes and Memorial reserve funds which are Long Term Liabilities.

The other function of this committee (as assigned by Session) is to recommend the amount to be allocated from the reserve funds (Legacy, MEND, Landscaping and Hayes) each year for use by the responsible committees (Trustees, Legacy and Worship). At the time of the meeting (December 14, 2022) it was decided to transfer 4% (based on the 3 year average balance) of the MEND Fund and the Hayes Fund to the respective Available to Spend accounts. Based on the lack of activity in the Legacy Available to Spend account, the committee decided not to transfer any money from the Legacy Fund.

**Corporation Meeting** President of the Board of Trustees Lisè Meloy called the meeting to order. The Clerk certified that a quorum was present. There was no new business. Meloy highlighted the 2021 work of the Board as presented in the Annual Report, thanked outgoing Trustees Sally Clyde and Kevin Montague and welcomed Pat Tillson and Vicki Lovecchio. The congregation voted to receive the report.

**The Congregational Meeting** reconvened and Pastor Lacroix outlined plans for his sabbatical this summer, to include Geneva, his birthplace in Belgium and the reformation in Scotland.

**Treasurer's Report** Treasurer Ed Mattote reviewed 2021. (See Annual Report) There were no questions. He then commented on the 2022 Budget which had been approved by the Session. (See Annual Report.) Mattote also thanked Financial Secretary Michelle Hall for her help and Pastor Lacroix thanked Mattote.

**Pastoral Terms of Call for 2022** Personnel Committee Chair Kevin Switala reviewed the terms (See Annual Report) after Pastor Lacroix and his wife Cyndi left the sanctuary and Pastor Cornelius excused herself from ZOOM. After Switala moved that the terms be approved, the congregation unanimously approved them.

Pastors Lacroix and Cornelius returned to the meeting, the congregation voted to receive reports of the Boards, Councils and organizations and to adjourn the meeting.

Pastor Cornelius closed the meeting with prayer.
