




THANKSGIVING



The five songs of praise that conclude the biblical psalter (Psalms 146–150) all begin and end with "Hallelujah!" That ecstatic Hebrew word is expanded here into the refrain that opens and closes this paraphrase of Psalm 147, an appropriate frame for its theme of thanksgiving.

This "short song," as the Iona Community calls it, can be especially effective as a means of setting a welcoming tone for a service (especially an ecumenical one). Like most such songs, it needs to be sung several times, adding and improvising harmony with each repetition.



Three-Year Terms

At the time, Suzan Hawkinson was the pastor and she very kindly and patiently helped me learn about the church, services and Presbyterians without making me feel like an ignorant outsider. We joined as members on the same day that all three of our children were baptized (during which my two boys decided to fence with the wooden cross and painted seashells in front of the entire congregation).

Since that time, I have served the church in so many ways. Our family changed the hymn numbers every week for many years. I have served on Session; the Worship, Personnel, Nominating and Memorial committees and a number of special committees (including to redecorate the education hall downstairs and the Reception Room). I have prepared and served communion, organized the serving of communion, acted as liturgist, decorated the church for holidays and lately Rick and I have begun ushering. We volunteered for Sprouts, youth group, Vacation Bible Camp and Summer Sunday School when our kids were young. Our whole family has volunteered for the Strawberry Festival in various capacities over the years. My children enjoyed their youth at the church under Pastor Rob and know the "Superman Grace Song" well.

For me, WPC provides a strong feeling of community and peace. Words that come to my mind about my fellow journeymen in faith at WPC include: acceptance, patience, kindness, collaboration, fun, thought-provoking, musical, understanding, helpful, inclusive, caring, engaged. I am looking forward to diving in with Session again!

Ver Picher

Helen and I joined the church in 1996, when our children started asking questions about God. It was clear some structured religious guidance was needed. Around that same time, Frank Noyes invited us to attend Rally Day. We felt immediately at home at the church: Our son's cub scout leader and den mother were both members and along with Frank we knew many other people from around the Wallingford community. More importantly, I could feel God moving through the church. I taught Sunday school at the church for many years, following my children as they grew from second grade up to fifth. After that I served as a Deacon and then as a Trustee. I have served on the Nominating Committee, the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee during the search that brought Rob Ross to us, the Stewardship Committee and the Vision 250 Campaign Committee. I currently serve on the Legacy Fund and Electronic Sign committees.

I grew up in Denver, Colorado and was raised Unitarian. The Unitarian Church was a strong and supportive community, but I don't remember much religious instruction in my Sunday school classes. My first big exposure to spirituality was when my family moved to Mexico for a few months. In high school, a friend introduced me to Christ, taking time to explain the passages in Jesus' conversation with Nicodemus and what it meant to be born again. In that moment, I became a Christian. Not being brought up in the Christian church, there are still things about its religious practices that mystify me, but I can speak to the power of God in my life. I am still learning.

John Stauffer

I first attended WPC with my family in the early 1950s, when Sunday school classes were held in Fellowship Hall. I formally become a member in 1958. (I married WPC member Darleen Brooks here, in 1978; and our two children attended SS.)
