INFORMATION FOR THOSE CONSIDERING THE CALL TO BE RULING ELDER, DEACON OR TRUSTEE

WHAT ARE THE QUALIFICATIONS?

The following qualifications are particularly important and necessary for individuals serving our congregation:

- Works well with others
- Is a good listener and listens to reason
- Is able to delegate
- Takes initiative and follows through on assignments
- Relates well with all groups and ages
- Is able to articulate ideas and thoughts clearly
- Is enthusiastic about the church and its future
- Is regular in worship attendance
- Evidences a growing faith
- Shows creativity and imagination

WHAT IS THE CALL PROCESS?

- 1. Should you accept this call, you will be elected at a special meeting of the congregation in September.
- 2. You will be ordained and/or installed shortly thereafter and begin service with the next meeting of your board.
- 3. Based on nominees' schedules, Pastor François and Pastor Taylor will hold a few orientation and training sessions to familiarize you with the duties and responsibilities of the office to which you have been nominated.
- 4. Your term of service is two years, ending in September 2027. Back-to-back repeat terms are not encouraged at WPC.
- 5. In the interim, if you accept this nomination, you are invited and encouraged to attend the meetings of your board where you will have voice but no vote.
- 6. We generally keep our meetings to 2 hours or less.

MORE DETAIL ABOUT THE ROLES

Ruling Elders

As there were in Old Testament times elders for the government of the people, so the New Testament church provided persons with particular gifts to share in discernment of God's Spirit and governance of God's people. Accordingly, congregations should elect persons of wisdom and maturity of faith, having demonstrated skills in leadership and being compassionate in spirit. Ruling elders are so named not because they "lord it over" the congregation (Matt. 20:25), but because they are chosen by the congregation to discern and measure its fidelity to the Word of God, and to strengthen and nurture its faith and life.

Ruling elders, together with teaching elders (Ministers of Word and Sacrament), exercise leadership, government, spiritual discernment, and discipline and have responsibilities for the life of a congregation as well as the whole church, including ecumenical relationships. When elected by the congregation, they shall serve faithfully as members of the session. When elected as commissioners to higher councils, ruling elders participate and vote with the same authority as teaching elders, and they are eligible for any office. The Session presently meets at 7:30 on the second Monday of the month. Session members are responsible for serving on one or more Councils and/or Committees.
