


Since Christ is Lord of heaven and earth, how can I keep from sing-ing?

PNC update, April 27, 2025

Good morning,

The Pastor Nominating Committee, the PNC, wanted to report on our progress to find a new pastor. This will be a regular alphabet soup of a report. The MDP (Ministry Discernment Profile) — basically a job description — is now live on the CLC—the Church Leadership Connection—the Presbyterian Church (USA) service to help congregations find pastors. We already have over 30 PDP's (Personal Discernment Profiles) from potential candidates for initial review. The PNC is now deciding whether to request a full application from these candidates.

So how did we get here and what comes next? The Congregation elected the 10 of us to the PNC on March 9. We had our kickoff meeting on March 12, meeting with representatives of the COM--the Commission on Ministry of the Presbytery of Philadelphia--which is guiding us through this process. We now meet weekly on Sunday evenings.

Our first task was to draft the MDP—job description. We were given a form to complete and questions to answer, and we were able to do that with extensive use of the Mission Study Team report that you all contributed to a few months ago.

We submitted the MDP to Session and it was approved in a few days, on April 6. Then, our Clerk of Session submitted it to the COM, who approved it on April 13. We then uploaded it onto the CLC website job bank, and it had to be approved again by COM. It was released to the public on the CLC website on April 17. If anyone knows of potential candidates in their networks, please refer them to the website, or ask us for a copy of the MDP.

What happens now? The CLC has sent us 25 "matches", that is, pastors who they know are looking for a new position. (Although, these pastors don't know that their information was sent to us.) In addition, pastors who are checking the website can send their own info to us, and we have received 8 of those so far. We are reviewing all of these and then, after discussion and discernment, we will invite some candidates to submit full applications. We will then review those applications and decide if we want to proceed further. In addition, we can request more "matches" from the CLC if we feel like we need more options.

We will keep you posted but note that we will not have much to say while we reflect and consider the possibilities before us, being guided by the Holy Spirit and your prayers.


