



FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Members and Friends,

You have heard me say from the pulpit that there is a joke among clergy that most pastors have only three sermons that they keep preaching in one way or another throughout their ministry.



As I approach my retirement, I have been reflecting on what my 'three' sermons have been.

Three Scriptures come to mind. The first from the prophet Micah 6:6-8. You know... "With what shall I come before the Lord... He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" During difficult and challenging times; corruption and pretensions of leaders in Jerusalem, and religious practice untethered from ethical performance, the prophet Micah never lost hope and faith in the future. **Trust in the Lord, always.**

The second is chapter thirteen of Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians often read at weddings but in fact words he wrote for the entire community to live by. Again, you know... "Love is patient: love is kind: love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not

irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things." For Paul it was all about building one another up...for the common good, in community with one another, always.

The Third is Jesus' call to follow as his disciples which we find in Matthew 4:18ff, Mark 1:16ff, Luke 5:8ff, John 1:35ff. We are invited by God's Grace to follow. "Follow me," Jesus calls out to us, called to be participants, not spectators, to follow where Jesus leads. The religion of Jesus as opposed to the religion about Jesus.



You have been kind, supportive and affirming throughout our years together, to listen to my sermons and to try, with me, to live the Word of God that informed them. Thank you. And thank the Holy Spirit who is always able to use my meager words to speak through them the gospel message of our crucified and risen Lord.

We have had a busy year together and the pages that follow, along with the images, show just how blessed we have been... and continue to be at Wallingford Presbyterian Church.



I am so very thankful for the strong and dedicated leaders of our church on the Session, Board of Deacons, and Board of Trustees. Of course, we good Presbyterians couldn't really function well doing things, 'decently and in order' without our Councils and Committees. And all the other groups that call WPC home, thank you, especially to all our 'quiet contributors' who selflessly do what needs to be done without prompting or being asked... you know who you are. And then, as I have shared many times, I have the best colleagues in the world with which to share in ministry here. Pastor Taylor, Lee, Nathan, Leslie are a treasure. CHILDREN'S MUSIC MINISTRY

- For Easter 2024, we produced an Easter Pageant, featuring costumes, scenery, props, dramatic reading and music!



NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The Nominating Committee works to identify those individuals whom God is calling to serve the church as members of Session, Deacons and Trustees. The Committee's goal is to present a diverse slate of committed and faithful members who are elected by the congregation to two- and three-year terms. The work was handled via in-person meetings, video meetings, email and phone calls. There were 12 positions to be filled.

The church has reduced the number of officers on Session, Deacons and Trustees from 15 to 12, and it has also reduced the term of service from three years to only two years. In conversations with candidates, it was clear that people were willing to undertake a two-year term of service where they might have a declined a three-year term.

This coming year, there are 13 positions to be filled, all for two-year terms.

The slate of church officers was presented to the congregation in September and the officers began serving their terms in October. Here at Wallingford Presbyterian Church we strive to create a warm, loving, safe environment for children to grow in friendship, fellowship, and faith. This year our children's ministry was booming with great attendance and bursting with renewed energy — the Spirit is up to something here at Wallingford Pres! We have many programs for children and here are some of the highlights from each this past year:

• Sprouts Monthly Program (K-5th) which is a themed night full of fun and friends where the kids get to eat dinner together, do activities, games, and end with a guitar-led song, devotional, and prayer.



-Highlights included Bowling Night at Sproul Lanes where the kids enjoyed a night of fun (many tried their hand at bowling for the first time!) and our End of the Year Celebration where the kids got to run through the sprinkler squealing with joy!

- -One highlight was when the shepherds and I made up little skits to start out the night and the kids laughed and laughed! Also, another favorite memory is when the kids did a beautiful job on their last night's performance and we closed the week with a celebratory hot dog dinner thank you Connections!





• The Children's Christmas Pageant was a roaring fun time and children did a splendid job (40 children in all!) Our theme was BREAKING NEWS: Live from Bethlehem!



-Highlights include: having the kids get so excited to actually help

choreograph the closing hand motions and dance for the pageant, seeing them laugh when I was being an overly-silly director, and seeing them feel so proud when the congregation clapped!



• Advent Open House had the best attendance in years! This is the best intergenerational event I've ever been part of — many thanks to Gail and Shirley and all of the Ed Council! Together our church family had the opportunity to sing, do crafts, enjoy one another's company, watch the Eagles game, eat good food, and celebrate together.

-Highlights include: sitting with the children on the floor for the reading of the children's story, and singing carols with Miss Lee including a very rowdy version of The 12 Days of Christmas!

- Time with Young Disciples is a time when children come forward during the service to have a little mini-sermonette just for them. The kids got the opportunity this year to do many new things including singing on-the-spot songs, searching for hidden clues, decorating the church, and learning about Bible stories.
- -Highlights include: their amazing and honest answers to the questions posed, seeing how excited they are to share about their week, and decorating the church with angels together!









- Worship Involvement was fantastic this past year as we had many children, youth, and young adults help in worship by serving as liturgists, ushers, hymn number helpers, singers, hand-bell ringers, pageant performers, and more!
- -Highlights were having only Confirmands serve as our Christmas Eve liturgists who did such a beautiful job, and seeing the children play HAND BELLS for the congregation!
- Sunday School is a program we offer during our 10am Sunday Services which is available to ages 18 months all the way up to 12 years of age. We have a Toddler Room, $K-2^{nd}$ Room, $3^{rd}-5^{th}$ Room, and also a monthly Breakfast Club class for our youth group students.

• Breakfast Club is a program offered for 6th-12th graders in which they meet once a month during the Sunday service for a lesson, and games — and also, breakfast is included! Many thanks to our teachers Frank, Bowe, and Kevin for making this possible!

-Highlights include: Welcoming our new teacher Frank to the group, and exploring new and updated curriculum for this new generation of kids!



• Confirmation is a program offered for our 9th - 12th graders in which they explore and wrestle with their faith through monthly lessons with Pastor Taylor and their mentors. They address the hard questions of faith in order to figure out what they believe, and at the end of the year-long journey they are given the opportunity to become members of WPC officially! -Highlights include: Having a group this year who is particularly interested in understanding the Bible, and also our fun conversations where we bounce back and forth with ideas and creativity together!

DEACONS

In September 2024 the Board of Deacons was reduced from 15 members to 12.



American Red Cross Blood Drive Wallingford Presbyterian Church has hosted Red Cross blood drives for 75 years. In March 45 pints were donated and 48 pints in October.

Care Networks Each WPC member is assigned a Deacon. Deacons send a letter or email to those in their Care Network to help build community and keep members informed about the life of the church. Members may contact their Deacon if they need assistance from Deacon Helpers. Photos of each Deacon and a list of their Care Network members is posted on a bulletin board near the choir room.



Visitation Each week a list of members with upcoming birthdays or anniversaries, illness, joys or sorrows is emailed to the deacons. On Sunday 2 deacons take the flowers from the sanctuary and divide them into small bouquets to deliver with a card to those on the list. Cards are usually sent to those members that may live a distance from WPC. Balloons are often given to children for their birthday. In this way we can celebrate and support each member of our congregation. This year the deacons have invited former deacons to help with visitations.



Deacon Helpers A questionnaire was distributed with the Sunday bulletin fall 2024 requesting volunteers to act as Deacon Helpers. Deacon Helpers can assist their fellow congregates by providing meals or a ride to church or pet sitting. Deacon Helpers also assist the deacons by visiting those who are ill or at home. To request a Deacon Helper contact the church administrator or any deacon. To volunteer as a Deacon Helper, contact your deacon.

General Mission The General Mission committee exists to help the members of WPC and our local community with an immediate need. Assistance is typically given in the form of gift cards to local big box stores. Assistance may also be given for an emergent need such as help with a

specific bill. Requests for assistance usually begin with a call to the church administrator or by directly contacting a deacon. All assistance is recorded in the church office. A packet of information for local food banks and county services is also provided.






Red Wagon WPC members, community members and the WCNS families generously fill the 3 Red Wagons with non-perishable foods, cleaning supplies and personal hygiene items. These donations are then given to 'Life Werks' at the Foundry Church Wallingford, City Team-Chester and the Media Food Bank. The Red Wagons are strategically placed at WPC events like Trunk or Treat and Strawberry Festival for the community to contribute.

Holiday Gift Cards In the fall deacons receive a list of families in need from the social worker for the Wallingford-Swarthmore School District. This 2024 holiday season the deacons delivered gift cards to the district office to be given to 51 families totaling \$2775.00.



Giving Tree All of the gift tags were taken from the Christmas trees and returned. The enormous generosity of the WPC family and the WCNS provided gifts and gift cards to local



Angel Tree Angel Tree is part of Prison Fellowship and provides children of an incarcerated family member to get a gift from that person. This year Prison Fellowship required a 20 child minimum to participate. WPC deacons agreed and were provided the contact information of the caretakers of the

20 children. Eventually, not all of the caretakers chose to participate and 16 gift requests were placed on the tree and all returned with gifts.

Member Fellowship Deacons host Coffee Hour quarterly.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES



The Trustees are responsible for maintenance and upkeep of the Church building, both Manses and all the grounds to ensure that they are safe for use, meet the needs of the many individuals and groups that use them throughout the year, and present a positive image within the surrounding community. Routine maintenance of the building structures and their grounds along with all utility systems, mechanical equipment, finishes, and fixtures is ongoing, along with larger repair projects and planned enhancements as needed to meet anticipated future needs. This work is done by members of the Trustees and volunteers from the congregation, often behind the scenes, who donate their time and expertise, and, for larger projects or where specialized skills or services are needed,

by outside contractors. Valuable assistance is also provided by members and leaders of our several Scouting troops during our Spring and Fall grounds-cleanup days.

Some significant projects completed during 2024 include: installation of carbon monoxide detectors hardwired into the existing monitored fire detector system, installation of blinds over the new Fellowship Hall casement windows, replacing the 11 remaining basement casement windows in the office/classroom wing with energy-efficient double hung windows, restoration of the red outer doors to the sanctuary hallway along with repainting of the doors plus the interior hallway and stairwell areas, replacing the leaking gutter of the kitchen roof on the Avondale Rd. side, professional pruning, maintenance and cabling of several trees and large shrubs consistent with the approved long-term tree maintenance plan for the property, and perhaps most noteworthy, installing air conditioning in Fellowship Hall made



possible by significant financial support for the project coming from the Parks Bequest. Both the Spring and Fall grounds clean-up projects were again successful with the critical manpower assist provided by our Scouting organizations.





Non-routine projects requiring attention in 2025 include rebuilding the frame of the A Manse front door plus related wall repairs, upgrading the exterior doors of the office/classroom wing for purposes of improved security and weather-tightness, and preparing for the A Manse change of occupancy (focus on heating and A/C systems, hot water heater, insulation, flooring maintenance, wall and ceiling painting, etc.) Longer term projects currently under Board consideration include installation of solar roof panels to offset daily electricity demand, and improved accessibility to Fellowship Hall, the Office wing and the Sunday School and nursery co-op areas.

Many thanks to outgoing 2024 Trustees Roger Freidinger, Ken Ezzell, Jean Stromberg, John Tiedeck and Walt Kaminski for their years of dedicated service, and welcome to incoming Trustees for 2025 Doug Shafer, David Rudd, and Mike Meloy. With the incoming 2025 Trustees, the size of the Board has been officially reduced from the previous 12 members to 8, while the scope of the Board's responsibility remains the same. Therefore, any member of the congregation (church member or not) who has experience working in areas such as electrical, plumbing, heating or air-conditioning, painting, carpentry, flooring, roofing, woodworking, gardening, etc. and who would be willing to assist by working on a small task from time to time, would be welcome. Please let us know by contacting either a member of the Board or the Church office of your interest.

EDUCATION COUNCIL



2024 was a vibrant, warm, and FULL year for the Education Council's initiatives. In May 2024, the leadership of the Education Council transitioned from Gail Weaver, who had moderated for many years, to Michelle George, who took over as moderator beginning in June. Additionally, we were pleased to welcome new members to the Education Council this year: Ashley Drane, Erin Vaccone, and Kristine Mulhorn.

Pastor Taylor started the year in her usual organized fashion by hosting a Sunday School teachers' luncheon in February. The meeting provided an opportunity to discuss the progress of each classroom and proactively address any unmet needs.

On Sunday, May 19th, the Education Council held the Sunday School teacher appreciation during the church service. Each teacher was gifted a plant, and a video was played to celebrate their contributions. The children sang a beautiful song in thanksgiving for our dedicated teachers.

Throughout the year, Pastor Taylor continued to organize and promote various activities for the Youth Group, Young Adults, and Sprouts group. Youth Group events included Putt-Putt and pizza outings. Sprouts activities included lessons on spending, saving, and sharing, crafting valentines for shut-ins, and an end-of-year BBQ. Additionally, Kids Cafe was offered for children in Kindergarten through 5th grade on the first Sunday of each month following the church service.





In a meeting with Pastor Taylor,

the Education Council agreed to introduce a weekly Summer Sunday School program for nursery-aged children (18 months to 5 years) and a video lesson with activities for children in 1st-5th grades. We were thrilled to have new parent volunteers who eagerly offered to teach during the summer months.

In July, the Education Council and volunteers worked together to organize a SCUBA-themed Vacation Bible Camp (VBC). The event featured lively music, crafts, and story time from 6:00 pm to 7:30 pm each evening for one week. Throughout the event, families contributed supplies for the Red Wagon, which were collected each evening.

In August, Pastor Taylor planned a Sunday School teachers' meeting to review the roles and procedures for teaching positions and to assign teaching dates for each classroom. Pastor Taylor also generously gifted each teacher a Sunday School teacher shirt. The classes offered this year included the Nursery (18 months to 5 years old), a "Mid-Level" class (5 years old through the end of 2nd grade), and a 3rd-5th grade class. Additionally, a Breakfast Club was held monthly for our teen members. We were grateful to have new parent volunteers joining our teaching team alongside our experienced and seasoned teachers.



In September, the Education Council kicked off the new school year with a fun and festive Rally Day. Students and families celebrated a new beginning by receiving new backpacks, goody bags, and participating in a Blessing of the Backpacks ceremony. Afterward, everyone enjoyed a children's-themed coffee hour.

October brought the annual "Socktober Drive," which was led by Shirley Rudd and Roger Demos in collaboration with the Mission and Service Committee. The drive collected new socks for adults in need, which were greatly appreciated by the recipients.

In November 2024, Roger Demos shared fascinating insights from his role as the church historian. Over the past 9-12 months, Roger compiled valuable historical data, including the early history of the church trustees, the history of the Strawberry Festival, the story of the church Chancel, and previous anniversary celebrations at WPC. Roger also uncovered "older" photos of the church and continues to work on updating the history of WPC. This month also included a discussion on upcoming updates to child safety procedures, as recommended by the church's insurance industry. These updates will be revisited in 2025.



December brought the exciting Advent Festival, where members of the Education Council and other gracious volunteers hosted an event that appealed to all ages. Attendees enjoyed children's crafts, listened to a Christmas story with Pastor Taylor, watched the Eagles game, savored children's snacks, and indulged in adult appetizers and drinks. The evening concluded with a heartwarming Christmas hymn sing. Later in December, over 35 children participated in the Christmas Pageant, which was led by Pastor Taylor, a group of dedicated volunteers and Music Director, Lee.

ABILITIES INITIATIVE



The Abilities Initiative continued to work diligently in 2024 to highlight and educate our congregation on topics that foster compassion and understanding for those experiencing a variety of impairments and different stages of life.

In the winter of 2024, Shirley Rudd and Michelle George led a well-attended presentation on the "Last Third of Life." The session sparked strong interest and laid the foundation for the year's focus on aging, which was officially launched with the "Series on Aging."

In the spring of 2024, a survey was distributed to assess the needs of the congregation regarding aging and related concerns. Additionally, four new books were added to the Abilities Initiative library to further support education on these topics.

At the end of September, Erin Vaccone spoke to over 20 members about "Advocating for Yourself in the Healthcare Arena." This presentation was highly beneficial to members of all ages, equipping them with practical tools for navigating healthcare systems and advocating for their own needs.



On November 17th, Cyndi LaCroix delivered a lighthearted and engaging presentation on "The Winter of Your Life" to over 20 members and their families. Cyndi introduced the "Five Wishes" program, which helps individuals organize their thoughts about end-of-life care, allowing them to express their wishes in a meaningful way.

As part of the ongoing efforts to support our congregation, the Yellow Dot Program was made available. This program provides members with a simple but effective tool to keep in their cars in case of emergency, ensuring emergency medical services (EMS) can access important health information quickly.

Throughout 2024, the Abilities Initiative was fortunate to add a few new members, bringing the total to five. After leading the initiative with dedication and enthusiasm for four years, Shirley



Rudd stepped down as leader in September 2024. Michelle George took over leadership, continuing the important work with renewed energy.



Looking ahead, the Abilities Initiative plans to host a Children's Training Series in the summer of 2025. This series will focus on educating children about compassion for people experiencing impairments such as challenges with speech, physical abilities, and hearing. The sessions will take place during the Sunday school hour, and the initiative will also begin planning events for the fall of 2025.

In addition, the Education Council continued to provide large-print bulletins, fidget items for individuals during church services, and children's visual schedules for those who request them. The Education Council also worked closely with the Sanctuary Committee, which is dedicated to making physical and technical updates to the church, such as improving video and audio capabilities, to ensure that everyone can access, view, and hear the services with ease.

STEPHEN MINISTRY

Stephen Ministry is a complete system of training and organizing lay persons for caring ministry in and around their

congregations. Stephen Ministers provide distinctively Christian care to those among us who are experiencing a time in their lives when they need to have a committed Christian friend journey with them for awhile. The WPC has been enrolled as a Stephen Series congregation since 1997. In 2024, the combined Stephen Ministry programs of WPC, Swarthmore Presbyterian Church (SPC) and Trinity Episcopal Church (TEC), continued to provide this care to all in our congregations and community who requested it. While virtual contact, which was necessary during the pandemic, is still happening, in-person meetings with care receivers is the norm now.

While the confidential nature of what we do prevents us from sharing the details of any of our relationships and makes providing photo images difficult, this ministry is deeply fulfilling to those providing care as well as to the care receivers. Over the 25+ years that WPC has been enrolled in Stephen Ministry, scores of care receivers have been helped and over 35 WPC members have been trained for and involved in providing care.

The currently serving Stephen Leaders from WPC are Roger Demos, Russ Kinder, and Bob Kenworthy.

Mission and Service



The Mission and Service Committee continues to be able to provide ongoing support for the amazing work of local and worldwide missions because of your generosity. Our church leadership faithfully includes our work in the budget and your additional gifts of money and time have made it possible for us to reach out in times of great need.

- The 2024 Christ Market raised \$4,020, in support of 10 organizations and their ministries to help those in need. This is doubled with a matching gift from Mission and Service funds.
- In the Fall, M&S partnered with the Sunday School and the congregation for Socktober where socks for men and women went to Savage Sisters in Kensington. Children's socks went to Chester Eastside. We also had a last-minute clothing drive to support Savage Sisters.
- We partnered again with our music director, Lee as she hosted three "Concerts for a Cause" throughout the year. We matched donations dollar-for-dollar up to \$500 for the concerts.





Your contributions to WPC continue to support our missionaries in their varied and much-needed ministries around the world: John Stauffer and The America Team for Displaced Eritreans, Jeni Pedzinski at her new position as Director of Mission Mobilization, New Life Center Foundation in Asia, Corey Booker and the Making a Change Group in Chester, and Chester Eastside and CityTeam in Chester. We spent time reviewing and revising our support as needs and conditions have changed.

Another important reminder, that there are 3 first aid areas in the church. In back of the church, in the kitchen, in the office area. There is also a AED charged and ready to go in the social hall. We have bandages, tourniquets, CPR masks, Choking mask suctions, fire blankets, ice packs and various sizes of splints.

I loved working with your Pastors, Session, Deacons and the Stephen ministers in order to bring thoughtful confidential care to all the needs of all of our members. I encourage you all to utilize the wealth of compassion and leadership of our community of faith.

- The Council prepares and serves coffee hour on a rotating basis with other Councils and Committees.
- Shirley Rudd with support from members of the Christian Ed Council, works to make worship more inclusive to all abilities.
- The Sanctuary Committee continues to work on adding new audio-visual equipment in the Sanctuary.

sense of humor.




PEACEMAKING AND SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL



The Strawberry Festival is WPC's annual outreach to the Wallingford community. Held on the first Monday in June since 1948, we invite our neighbors to share food, games, books, treasures and fellowship.

On June 3, 2024, God and the weather shone brightly upon WPC for the annual Strawberry Festival. By all accounts this year's Festival was quite a success, due of course, to the many volunteers, both seasoned veterans and new, the BSA Scout Troops, the various activity leaders and all of their tireless hard work. Aside from the delicious strawberries, food and cakes, Attic Treasures and the Book Nook were leaders in popularity both with donors and customers. The games and Bounce Houses were very popular with the kids. As last year, the Attic Treasures opened early to allow for dealers and earnest treasure hunters to get a first crack at things. New this year was the use of POS for credit sales. This along with early ticket sales helped make for shorter lines and quicker transactions.







In addition to community outreach, the Strawberry Festival supports mission work with 75% of the net proceeds donated to an organization approved by Session based on recommendations by the Mission and Service Committee. This year's recipient was Chester Eastside, Inc. to support their afterschool club and summer program. In addition, 15% is given to the BSA Scout Troops and Cub Pack for their support of the Festival, and 10% is retained to support future Festivals. This year the Strawberry Festival netted \$6,392.23.

WALLINGFORD COOPERATIVE NURSERY SCHOOL



Down here in the basement of WPC, the Co-op is thriving. We continue to provide high quality nursery school for local families. Most of our applications come from alumni families and word of mouth recommendations. Our enrollment is full but not quite maxed out this year. One of our three's classes had several unexpected late to midyear withdrawals which resulted in a much smaller than normal class. The enrollment for that

class will likely affect the size of the four-year-old classes and the kindergarten complement classes in the subsequent years.

There were a lot of staffing changes from 22/23 to 23/24 but many of which were just role changes. The biggest of these was personal. After 15 years as the teacher of the Elephant class, I stepped down to focus on the director position and frankly to work a little less. Allison Constable moved from teacher in the Meerkat class to the Elephant class. After many years of teaching the Hippo class Emma Clauser-Schwartz was thrilled to be able to teach the Meerkat class. Stephanie Dykes began teaching the Hippos in addition to the Giraffe class and the afternoon Kindergarten Complement class. Some staff left the co-op. Abby Finney moved away and Jess Trout took on a new job. Filling the open aide positions was an easy task. Several of our co-op parents and some on the Executive Committee reached out with





interest. Hilary Lear was hired in the Meerkat class, Ashley Drane was hired as the Hippo Aide. Aimee Hodges was hired as an aide in the Lion class. Arianne Allan was hired to teach gym. After a brief departure Theresa Burch was rehired to work in the Meerkat classroom.



The summer months of 2024 were productive at the co-op. Stephanie Dykes ran a successful summer camp program. We hired a painter and had several classrooms, hallways and bathrooms painted. After many years of use (18?) we replaced the train on the playground. We were happy to have a co-op family come take the old one for their own use.

After a year of using Jovial, we are hooked. It's been a great system to use for tuition billing and collection, getting families to read and sign our health, billing and co-op policies. Using Jovial means that tuition and extended day payments are collection on time with much less work on our part.

We held several successful fundraisers, were held and financially our year was strong. As we build up our financial reserve, we are beginning to plan for replacing the large wooden playground structures.

STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL



As stewards of the church, Stewardship Council oversees its financial resources and the application of church funds toward purposes approved by Session. It has two subcommittees—Annual Giving and Capital Campaign (currently inactive). It coordinates with the Legacy Committee and Financial Oversight committees and works closely with the church treasurers to develop and monitor the annual budget. The Stewardship Council meets every couple of months (more toward the end of the year) to

monitor income and expenses.

This year, the Stewardship Council also managed the process to surface ideas on how to use the very generous bequest from the Parks family and made recommendations to Session on special projects that were outside the regular budget. In addition, we commissioned a review of the financial accounts of the church and the nursery school, and we will make adjustments accordingly to our financial statements. Overall, the review confirmed the church's financial record keeping.

Annual Budget

The church ended 2024 with income over expenses by about \$20,000. This was due in large part because we are now reflecting investment income in the P&L (profit and loss statement, also known as the statement of activities). In previous years, investment income was accounted for on the balance sheet but not the active budget. Expenses were slightly below budget, which helps the bottom line, but pledge and plate offerings were also below budget. We again made an end-of-year appeal to the congregation to remember the church with year-end giving, and there was a nice increase in contributions.

The 2024 budget, like the year before, reflected the increase in activities that we have experienced since the end of the pandemic. For 2025, the Stewardship Council recommended, and Session approved, an aspirational budget that reflects the busyness of our church, supports our mission to serve members and the community, compensates staff in a way that makes up for previous years of low compensation, and preserves our historic church and operations. In addition, Stewardship developed an estimate of costs that will likely be incurred in the search for and transition to the new senior pastor.

Annual Giving Committee

The Annual Faith Giving Campaign this year celebrated what an exciting church we have become, able to make changes while respecting our traditions and history, resulting in an ever-growing family of faith. We asked members to tell us what they anticipate being able to give next year, and we marked each pledge with a visual reminder of our growth, based on the old nursery rhyme "here is the church, and here are the people," giving the children a chance to put a happy face for each pledge onto a large



representation of our church. We are deeply grateful to the 78 families and individuals who responded to the call by pledging a total of \$360,000. We note, with some concern, that this is somewhat fewer people and lesser amount of funds than the previous year. We need continued support if we are too experience continued growth and participation.

Thank you to co-treasurers Ed Mattote and Todd Darr as well as our counters and bookkeeping staff, with special appreciation to retiring co-treasurer Ed Mattote. He has providing outstanding service to the church and Stewardship Council.

FINANCIAL OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE

Present: Jim Oetinger, Ed Mattote, Todd Darr, Earl Varney

<u>Background</u> The Available to Spend Accounts were established by Session and detailed in the <u>Wallingford Presbyterian Gifts and Funds</u> document to encourage spending from the Legacy and MEND Funds by the responsible committees without having to make a formal request to Session.

Financial Oversight is charged with determining how much to allocate to these accounts each year based on the financial performance of the underlying reserve funds for the previous 3 years, amount of spending in the previous year and anticipated needs in the coming year. The maximum allocation cannot exceed 4.5%.

The committee reviewed the 10/30/24 balances in the reserve fund accounts and Available to Spend accounts for Legacy and MEND. Based on the anticipated needs, it was decided to give \$10,000 allocations to both the Legacy and MEND available to spend accounts 2295 and 2297.

These allocations do not reduce the respective reserve fund balances until there is spending.

PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

The Personnel Committee supports the staff through annual reviews and salary recommendations, maintaining the employee handbook, and managing the hiring process as needed. In 2024, the staff remained the same, and the annual reviews of all the staff were quite positive. The Personnel Committee recommended salary increases that brought staff salaries in line with COLA changes over the past 4 years (making up for very low increases in past years). The Stewardship Council and Session approved the increases.

In addition, the Personnel Committee helped the pastors make the transition to the new benefits plan provided by the Presbyterian Board of Pensions. The new plan tailors benefits to the individual needs of each pastor and saved the Congregation about 15% on benefits costs while still providing the same level of benefits to our staff.

It has been a joy to welcome so many additions to our rolls. In addition to our members, we have more than 40 people who worship with us regularly, some of whom plan to join in the coming year.



Annual Meetings of the Congregation and Corporation Wallingford Presbyterian Church Wallingford, Pennsylvania January 28, 2024 Minutes



Following the worship service, moderator the Reverend François Lacroix called the meeting to order and opened with prayer. He reminded the congregation that only members can vote. Clerk Chris Darr certified that there was a quorum.

The congregation moved to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the Annual Meetings of January 29, 2023 (found in the Annual Report).

Clerk report. Clerk Chris Darr described the 2023 review of the church rolls, the first one done in several years as the last one was interrupted due to the pandemic and it did not seem appropriate to review the rolls until the church had returned to a more "normal" post-pandemic environment. While many members were removed from the rolls due to inactivity, the number of truly active people increased in 2023 as 18 new members joined.

Darr also reminded the congregation of the online church directory on the Church Center app and encouraged members to update their pictures on the app and to "join" the directory if they had not already done so.

New Business: None

Mission and Ministry. Both Pastors Lacroix and Cornelius commented on their work and the ministry of the congregation. They noted that 2023 felt like the first year that the church was able to move past the pandemic and that there was renewed energy and commitment. They recognized staff members and volunteers, with special mention of the parents of children who have made a commitment to bring them to church. Pastor Lacroix said that the Wallingford Cooperative Nursery School celebrated its 68th year.

Several members complimented Pastor Cornelius on the work she had done to grow the children and youth programs. Several new members provided positive feedback on the church.

Nominating Committee. Nominating Committee Member Lisé Meloy thanked Chair Nancy Oetinger, Zoe Andrews, David Haury, Judy Kenworthy, Pam Mattote, Lisé Meloy, Kristine Mulhorn, Helen Picher, David Rudd, and alternates Pat Tillson and Walt Kaminski for their service on the Nominating Committee and stated that they officially were relieved of their duties.

Meloy presented the following members to serve as 'at large' members of the 2024 Nominating Committee: Pam Mattote, Lisé Meloy, Jenny Montague, Jim Oetinger and David Rudd, and alternate members Nancy Curtis and Walt Kaminski. Pastor Lacroix added that there will also be two Session members, one Deacon and one Trustee serving on the Nominating Committee. There were no nominations from the floor. The congregation voted to approve the nominees.

The meeting of the congregation was suspended so that the meeting of the corporation could be held.

Corporation Meeting. President of the Board of Trustees Bruce Clark called the meeting to order. The Clerk certified that a quorum was present. There was no new business. Clark thanked the outgoing Trustees David Haury and Gail Weaver and welcomed new trustees Cary McHugh and Bud Fury.

Clark highlighted the 2023 work of the Board and longer-term projects under consideration as presented in the Annual Report. He also highlighted that in 2023, a survey of the property was done and the Trustees discovered that two abutting properties had encroached on the church property. The Trustees sought legal advice regarding how to proceed, informed both property owners, and asked them to enter into an agreement indicating that (1) they knew they had encroached and (2) the church could ask them to remove the encroachment in the future. One owner removed the encroachment; the other owner signed the agreement, which was subsequently recorded in the courthouse in Media.

Following a question regarding an electronic sign, Pastor Lacroix indicated that a separate committee is working on this initiative.

The congregation voted to receive the report and to adjourn the Meeting of the Corporation.

The Congregational Meeting reconvened.

Treasurer's Report. Treasurer Ed Mattote reviewed the 2023 financials. (See Annual Report.) Mattote also thanked the counters and financial secretary Michelle Hall for their service. He then presented the 2024 Budget which was adopted by the Session. (See Annual Report.) There were no questions.

Pastoral Terms of Call for 2024. Personnel Committee Chair Helen Picher reviewed the terms of call (see Annual Report) after Pastor and Cyndi Lacroix and Pastor Cornelius left the sanctuary. After a motion to approve the terms of call, the congregation unanimously approved them.


Pastors Lacroix and Cornelius returned to the meeting and the congregation voted to receive reports of the Boards, Councils and organizations.
